In these unprecedented times, we believe it's even more important to demonstrate the connectivity of our region, in addressing and collaborating to meet the needs of our vulnerable learners.

In 2018, Nasen and the Whole School SEND consortium, were awarded a contract by the DFE to equip the workforce to deliver high quality teaching across all types of SEN.

The Whole School SEND Schools' Workforce contract is committed to improving outcomes for children and young people with SEND by networking, collaborating and unlocking the answers that exist within the system.

There are 4 aims:

Aim 1: Drive education institutions to prioritise SEND within their CPD

Aim 2: Equip schools to identify and meet their training needs in relation to SEND

Aim 3: Build the skills of teachers

Aim 4: Identify and respond to any gaps in the training and resources available to schools

To achieve this, Nasen and Whole School SEND appointed 8 Regional SEND Leaders to:

- Establish regional SEND hubs
- **Build local networks**
- Highlight regional SEND priorities in light of SEND index reports utilising community of practice knowledge
- Provide support to LAs with Written Statements of Action
- Meet with RSC, TSC and OA leads (where relevant)

The Regional SEND Lead for East Midlands, South Yorkshire and the Humber, is Judith Smith, **Executive Principal, Wellspring Academies Trust** and Positive Regard TSA. The Deputy for our region is Jane Starbuck, Education Improvement Advisor (SEND) for Nottinghamshire County Council.

STEM Clubs are out-of-timetable sessions that provide young people with the chance to explore

aspects of STEM (Science, Technology, Engineering & Mathematics) in less formal settings. They aim to enrich, rather than deliver, the curriculum. Clubs are an important outlet to ignite new interest or raise attainment in STEM subjects through more imaginative and inventive teaching methods.

As the Lincolnshire Science Hub and STEM Club Champion we are here to help deliver free CPD workshops; face-to-face and remotely to all statemaintained secondary schools and FE colleges to sustain and grow their own clubs, as well as offering additional support to start STEM Clubs for young people.

Courses are being run remotely for anyone who wants to set up an Online Club, these are free and take place through an online community group. More details are available here



Apprenticeship Programmes for School Leaders

Did vou know.....

- Apprenticeship qualifications can be accessed by staff already in post?
- Apprenticeship qualifications range from entry level to degree and masters degree level qualifications?
- For many schools and academies, apprenticeship programmes can be funded through the apprenticeship levy?

LTT has been working with The National College for Education (NCE) who have designed three apprenticeship programmes specifically for aspiring and established leaders in schools. Leaders

undertaking these programmes will gain a nationally recognised qualification.

Maths Hub are still offering opportunities for schools and teachers to be involved in Work Groups next academic year.

The following opportunities for applications now:

Primary Mastery Specialists

Teachers who wish to apply to be trained by the NCETM as a Primary Mastery Specialist (Cohort 6) will find further information and an application through this link.

Participant schools receive a grant of £3000 to enable release time for teachers.

Mastery Readiness Work Groups

This Work Group helps schools develop vital skills and practices to enable them to develop teaching for mastery across the school. Schools access free workshops and bespoke support before progressing

to a full Teaching for Mastery Development Work Group in autumn 2021. Selection criteria do apply.

Primary Teaching for Mastery Development Work Groups

A further opportunity for schools to receive support to develop their approach to teaching for mastery. Places are limited this year. Schools receive £1000 participation grant to enable two teachers to attend half termly meetings and school support visits.

Primary Teaching for Mastery Sustaining Work Groups (New)

This is an opportunity for ANY school who has previously been involved in a teaching for mastery Work Group, from any cohort since the programme began, to re-engage with the programme and work with colleagues from other schools to further develop their understanding of mastery. Group clusters of up to 12 schools will be led by an experienced Specialist.

Secondary Mastery Specialists

Applications are currently open for secondary maths teachers who wish to join this 3-year programme of training through the NCETM. Participants schools receive a participation grant of £3000 for 25 days release time. The deadline for applications is 8th June 2020. Further details can be found here.

Secondary Teaching for Mastery Development **Work Groups**

Applications from schools who wish to introduce and develop teaching for mastery will be accepted from 3rd June. Schools will nominate two teachers as Mastery Advocates and will be entitled to a grant of £2000 to enable teachers release time.

East Midlands with both Primary and Secondary Schools. With an aim of training a minimum of 100 schools, we have been working closely with the DfE to recruit and train specialists. The specialists will then train schools directly with the latest DfE materials. This will be 'virtually' in the first instance due to the current circumstances. Each school will receive £50 funding to support the time dedicated to this training. Mobilise PLCs summer term

Applying the Mobilise PLC-model, the central team facilitated 14 sessions to 219 participants. Of those attending, 140 were from infant, junior or primary; 65 were from secondary, 6 from special and 8 representing all phases for a Trust. 35 of all attendees are not currently part of a year 4 Mobilise project and 4 have never previously engaged in Mobilise.

Having received the reading and a complementary video in advance, discussion was based on the neuroscience evidence-base researched by Dr Bruce Perry – The Neurosequential Model of Therapeutics, which translates into the '3 Rs' - regulate, relate and reason. It was agreed that this is a simple model that can be easily implemented in the classroom and shared with parents for a consistent approach to well-being as families adapt to the easing of restrictions and adjust back to a new way of engaging in learning. The principles are, of course, relevant outside of the current pandemic to enable pupils to engage emotionally and cognitively in the classroom and reduce incidents of more challenging

behaviour; the importance of adults being regulated and co-regulation was highlighted.

Each session was generously supported by a combination of professionals from: Pilgrim Hospital School, BOSS Family Action, Working Together Team, Caring2Learn, Futures in Mind, Mindspace Stamford, Joseph Norton Academy in Huddersfield and Mary Meredith at LCC, who added their expertise to the discussion and have shared a wealth of useful documents that are freely available on the Mobilise website:

As always, schools have been encouraged to share the evidence-base and follow-up presentation and 'take-aways' (a compilation of practical strategies to support schools to prepare to welcome the return of more staff and pupils and stay connected to those yet to return and to apply the 3Rs) relevant to their context, in their own setting.
